

CODE COMMITTEE

The Code Committee meets Monday mornings from 9:30AM-11:00AM in the Small Card Room (SCR) in the Office Building and are available to answer questions & provide guidance necessary for all exterior project requests. You can also call 732-244-8686 Ext.#220 and leave a message.

An approved Zoning & Construction

Application, including all specifications necessary for the proposed project, as well as a Holiday Heights Project Permit, are required before any work can begin. We continue to require approval for any exterior project before work begins. Please note: A Berkeley Township permit will be required when applicable. A copy of the Berkeley Township permit, as well as the Holiday Heights Project Permit, are required to be posted prior to the start of any work.

The Code Committee continues to process applications for exterior projects as quickly as possible. The expected time for review and approval is approximately two (2) weeks. We ask for your patience and your consideration of this timeline when planning all projects.

RESERVING A DATE FOR EVENTS, MEETINGS **OR TRIPS**

To reserve a room in one of our buildings for any event, meeting or when scheduling a trip, you must first contact the office for available dates. A Calendar Appointment Form must be completed for all reservations. The Recreation Chairperson and the Liaison Director for Recreation must approve all requests.

KITCHEN SIZE PLASTIC BAGS

Please be aware kitchen size plastic bags containing refuse are not allowed to be placed at the curb or stored on a Homeowners' property. Violations will result in fines. Please cooperate to help protect our Community.

MAIL DROP BOX – For your convenience, when the office is closed, you can drop off your association dues payments or any other documents, in our convenient mail drop box located outside the front door to the Office Building.

EMERGENCY CONTACT INFORMATION

It is very important that the office has a valid phone number and an emergency contact number on file. If your information has changed, please call the office at 732-244-8686. It only takes a minute to update and it very well may save your life in case of an emergency!

RELOCATING-If you are planning on relocating to another address, selling your home, leaving your home vacant or have any other changes regarding your Home/Owner status, please notify the office so your information can be updated in our master files.

GARAGE/ESTATE SALE PERMITS

As per the Berkeley Township Municipal Code: Chapter 5-7.4: "The assessed owner of a property may have two (2) garage or yard sales per year. Each sale may not consist of more than two (2) consecutive days. A Berkeley Township permit is required to be

obtained for each yard sale conducted. There is no fee for the first permit. There will be a five-dollar (\$5.00) fee for the second permit. Permits are only available from the Berkeley Township Municipal Clerk."

NO DUMPING IN THE BASINS!

<u>DUMPSTERS / PODS</u> – Contact the Code Committee before planning to have a dumpster or storage pod placed in your driveway. Dumpsters and pods are not allowed on any street within the Holiday Heights Community.

PARKING - Commercial vehicles are not permitted in your driveway. Parking on your lawn is also not permitted.

<u>COMPLAINTS</u> All complaints must be submitted in writing to the Code Committee ,with your name, address and signature. All written complaints will remain anonymous. You can obtain these forms from the Holiday Heights website or from the Clubhouse office.

CONTRACTOR SIGNS

No Contractor signs are to be left on lawns following completion of work.

CURBING YOUR PET-All pets must be confined within the Owner's Living Unit except when being walked on a hand-held leash, not to exceed six feet (6') in length. Pet Owners are permitted to use the easement/patch of grass between the sidewalk and the curb. Walking pets in the street is discouraged due to safety issues for Owners and pets. Pet Owners shall keep their pets off other Owners' properties, Clubhouse Grounds and Common Properties. All Pet Owners must collect their pet's feces. Failure to pick up after your pet is a Holiday Heights fineable offense for each occurrence. There will also be an additional fine for each infraction under the Berkelev Township Ordinance (05-25-OAB-3) We expect all pet Owners to be respectful of other Owners and in return, we expect Owners to show the same respect for pet Owners.

IMPORTANT INFO TO KNOW:

- 1. If you see anything suspicious, please call the Police at 732-341-6600.
- 2. When walking at night, wear light colored clothing and carry a flash light.
- 3. Be careful with credit cards and check your statements. Never give a caller your information over the phone.

- 4. The best way to protect yourself and your home is to lock your car and house and always leave a light on when you are away.
- 5. If you are away, have someone pick up your mail, newspaper, and the monthly Courier
- 6. Please do not respond to unsolicited phone calls. The IRS and utility companies will never call you about an overdue bill. Never respond to requests from unfamiliar or unrecognized numbers. These are scammers looking for your money! Just hang up!



Holiday Heights Homeowners' Association Snow Removal Rules & Regs

PLEASE BE PATIENT AS THERE ARE OVER 1,400 HOMES TO PLOW

- Berkeley Township Snow Ordinance (7-8.3) When Berkeley Township streets have become snow covered during snow storm emergency situations, it is unlawful to park vehicles on the streets until the snow has stopped and the roads have been cleared. Berkeley Township plowing will only be done after 5 inches of snow accumulation, a dusting of snow will not be plowed. Since many home driveways cannot accommodate more than one car, we suggest parking additional cars on your grass, next to your driveway, in order to clear the streets for the plows. There is a Berkeley Ordinance against parking on the lawn, but we have cleared it with the Berkeley Township Police Department and there will be no tickets issued for this during snow storms.
- Once Berkeley has plowed the streets, you should remove your car(s) from the driveway and front lawns, parking them in the street. Our contractor will not plow your driveway if there is a car parked there. All Aprons will be plowed. Aprons of homes on the No Plow list will be cleared.
- Our Contractor will start removing the snow after the streets are plowed by Berkeley Township and we are cleared to start.
- Driveways will be plowed starting 1 to 3 feet from the garage door. To prevent denting of garage doors, snow drifts against the doors should be removed prior to the driveway being plowed. Contractor will not be liable for damages.
- · Contractor is not responsible for scratches or damage to driveways.
- Contractor is not responsible for any personal injury that may occur before, during or after snow removal.
- · Contractor is not responsible for snow removal in front of the mailboxes.

WE ASK THAT EVERYONE PLEASE BE PATIENT!!!

Homeowners are responsible for clearing the sidewalks in front of their home. Complaints regarding
clearing and damage to mailboxes should be directed to Berkeley Township (<u>Do not call the office</u>).

Plowing is done in the following order:

- Clubhouse Pathway for plowing company staging area, emergency vehicles & Board members.
- 2. Clubhouse Parking Lotin case it needs to be used as a Homeowners-emergency shelter.
- 3. Residents homes

<u>PROCEDURES FOR NOT PLOWING DRIVEWAYS</u>— The HOA and Contractor will not be responsible for damage done to Designer Driveways.

 As in prior years, you are required to come into the HOA office and sign a NO SNOW PLOW form, as your Homeowners' Association cannot be responsible for any damage to your driveway.

RIBBONS will be issued for no-plow driveways. Ribbons can be obtained from the clubhouse office. It is your responsibility to place a ribbon on your mailbox or park your vehicle at the end of the driveway. Please do not use holiday decorations on or around your mailbox. The plow drivers must be able to see your ribbons clearly. If you fail to take the proper measures, your Association and the contractor will not be held responsible for any damages done to your driveway.

PLEASE NOTE:

 The Association will not be responsible for damage done to designer driveways. If you want your designer driveway plowed, you must come into the office and sign a waiver.



We might even let you recite poetry or sing opera to an empty house from the stage in the name of testing mikes.

It was during the pandemic, a time of pervasive isolation, that she was impacted by the overwhelming feeling of loneliness in the air. She pondered those vibes and tucked them away in her heart.

Meanwhile, during that same time, Veronica was witnessing women moving into her neighborhood and looking forward to welcoming them. But we were living in a time of masks and the restraints of remaining six feet away from one another, and the feelings of loneliness engulfed her as well. At that point, one of the new neighbors asked Veronica's husband if we had a Women's Club in Holliday Heights. He in turn presented the thought to Veronica and that thought tugged at her heartstrings. In a moment of casual conversation with Janice, she said, "Why don't we start a Women's Club." Because Janice's heart was already there, she gave her "yes" and the wheels of a prospective Women's Club began to turn.

The archives show that Holiday Heights did have a Women's Club at one time, but these ladies had to start from square one to make this dream a reality. First, they had to propose this idea to the Board, and they received a resounding "yes" from them. However, that was only the beginning. They needed a steering committee to help them draw up By-Laws. They became a sanctioned part of the Recreation Department and needed to open a bank account. Although they do not run money-making events, they do collect a fee of \$10.00 from each member for dues. Viola! The office of Treasurer was created with Pat Ganzer at the helm. They are still seeking a secretary.

Their mission statement became, "We are Women supporting Women", but then the brainstorming began as to how they would go about fulfilling their dream. The first meeting attracted 50 members! They gathered in the auditorium and over refreshments began brainstorming. These women were jotting down their thoughts, and an agenda of sharing, caring, and mutual support was born.

Their Thanksgiving project was to create a tree of gratitude. Each woman wrote words of thankfulness on a leaf made from construction paper, and the leaves adorned a tree of blessings that was dis-

played in the lobby. Their other accomplishments to date have been a clothing drive to donate to <u>Share The Warmth</u>, an organization that clothes the homeless. They had a successful cookie swap where not only did they share delicious baked goods, but they exchanged recipes. One of the ladies volunteered to offer baking lessons in her kitchen to another grateful member who had never baked before! At that same Holiday meeting, the centerpieces of hand-made Christmas trees became the focal point of what will be an arts and crafts project for next year's Holiday meeting.

New bonds were serendipitously formed at those meetings. One woman with a gifted voice befriended the leader of the chorus which she joined just in time to sing at the tree-lighting ceremony. From another chance meeting, one woman was led to teach billiards. They also had a fun day of candy-bar Bingo open to all residents of Holiday Heights.

The club is reaching out to women who are shutins and alone, who might welcome a friendly phone call from time to time. They have invited speakers to talk on women's health issues, beauty, safety, estate planning and finances.

The ladies meet in the auditorium on the first Saturday of each month from 9:30 to 11:00. There are presently 91 members, where refreshments are served, and the hearts of these wonderful volunteers are also nourished through giving and receiving LOVE!





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HOLIDAY HEIGHTS FIRST AID SQUAD

The Holiday Heights First Aid Squad was formed in 1987 to serve the residents of Holiday Heights. We currently work a 12-hour shift from 7 am until 1900 (7 pm). The days we work are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday.

Each crew consists of an EMT or Certified Assessor, a driver/ lifter and an information specialist. Both of our ambulances are equipped with hydraulic stretchers that lift the patient into the ambulance.

There are 3 requirements to become a squad member: having a valid driver's license, getting CPR certified, and being able to get on and off the ambulance unassisted.

All crew members are certified in CPR and the use of an AED. Classes are provided in the squad

building, and all costs are covered by the squad. Members that want to be certified as an Assessor or EMT may take the required class at no cost. Drivers attend a CIVO or Advance Emergency Drivers class. Additionally, there are other classes offered by the town or County, and attendance is voluntary.

Uniform shirts and jackets are provided by the Squad. You will need black pants and black shoes.

Most Crews work two or three days per month, and we also have one mandatory meeting per month, usually the fourth Wednesday of the month.
